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Research & Innovation Updates

Aquatic Biodiversity Assessment in Thimphu

The Bhutan Ecological Society (BES) in collaboration with CNR, has successfully completed an Aquatic Biodiversity Assessment in Thimphu under the Plastic Free Rivers and Seas for South Asia (PLEASE) initiative. The study was a crucial step in understanding freshwater biodiversity, water quality, and plastic pollution across 12 streams and rivers in Thimphu.

The preliminary findings indicate a concerning decline in aquatic biodiversity following the August 10 2024 flash flood, with a nearly 75% drop in recorded samples. The findings also detected microplastic contamination in multiple sites, particularly in areas receiving urban runoff and wastewater discharge.



Training on Technology Driven Agri-Business Proposal Development, Investment Analysis, and Digital Marketing for the Youths of Bhutan



Nine passionate members of the Entrepreneurship Club, CNR, participated in an insightful training focused on technology-driven agri-business proposal development, investment analysis, and digital marketing, tailored for Bhutanese youth. The PhD scholars in Climate Studies at CNR, in collaboration with the B-KIND Tarayana Foundation Research Project, shared and validated their research findings with stakeholders, addressing the following key aspects:

1. Livelihoods strategies in three agroecological zones and Gender Transformative approaches.

2. Climate change impacts livelihood in the three agroecological zones and Hot spring and hot stone bath therapy.

3. Livelihood Vulnerability Assessment (LVI&LV IIPPC).

4. Food Diversity and Food Habits Towards Food Security in Western Bhutan.

5. Human-wildlife interactions: Economic losses and their impact on livelihood (count of domestic animals killed by wild animals)

6. Sustainability status of agriculture and comparative analysis of conventional and organic potato production.




Enhancing Skills & Preparedness

The conference underscored the importance of cross-sectoral partnerships and policydriven investments to achieve sustainable agricultural development in the region.




Special Updates

National Conference on "Connecting Practitioners and Researchers"

The National Conference, focusing on Climate Crisis, Natural Disasters, Environmental Sustainability, Agriculture, and Food, was held at the College of Natural Resources. It was jointly organized by the Department of Academic and Research Services, the Office of the Vice Chancellor, and the Centre for Rural Development Studies, CNR.

The event brought together researchers from the Royal University of Bhutan, representatives from various government and non-governmental organizations, agrientrepreneurs, practitioners, scholars, and experts. They presented papers on pressing and emerging issues concerning the climate crisis, natural disaster, environmental sustainability, agriculture, and food security.
